- I chose to access all five suggested passages and offer some background along with my takeaways:
- Psalms 122; 145 ... (Author David, between 1440 and 586BC)
 Psalms is at the center of the Bible, hmmm? 122: "What
 Jerusalem was for the Israelites, the church is to the believer" so delight in worship, praise the Lord and pray for peace; 145: ... speaking of a time when all people will join in recognizing and worshipping God; many impactful adjectives describing God; reminded me of "let qo, let God;"
- **Psalms 40; 67 ... 40:** (Author David) while patiently waiting, love God, serve others, tell others about God; 67: (Anonymous) Joy comes from spreading the good news about God; a familiar refrain: "May God be gracious to us and bless us and make his face shine upon us, that your ways may be known on earth, your salvation among all nations."
- Isaiah 1:10-20 ... (Author Isaiah, speaking to Israel-Northern & Judah-Southern, about 700BC); Isaiah warns that their rebelliousness will have consequences they will not like, with reference to Sodom and Gomorrah; God does not abandon us, but our sin separates us from God; seek a meaningful relationship w/God, confess your sins, obey God's instructions, communicate regularly in prayer;
- 1 Thessalonians 1:1-10 ... (Paul to young, persecuted Christians in the church at Thessalonica; ~AD51); Paul gave thanks for their work produced by faith ... labor prompted by love, and ... endurance inspired by hope in ... Jesus Christ."
- Luke 20:1-8 ... (religious leaders challenge Jesus' authority; ~AD60) ... the leaders question where Jesus got his authority; responding with his own question as to whether John's baptism came from heaven or from men, they carefully responded "we don't know;" Jesus then says he will not answer their question either ...;
- 1 Corinthians 13:13 ... (Paul to the church in Corinth; AD55) ... a bonus I threw in because it is a favorite of mine, and I like the entire chapter, ending with verse 13; "And now these three remain: faith, hope, and love. But the greatest of these is love."

Tuesday, December 3

THE DRUMMER BOY

"The Little Drummer Boy" is a popular Christmas song written in 1941. It was originally known as "Carol of the Drum" and is based on a traditional Czech carol. Although there isn't any reference to a drummer boy in the Christmas story in Matthew 1–2 and Luke 2, the point of the carol goes straight to the heart of

the meaning of worship. The carol describes how a boy is summoned by the Magi to the scene of Christ's birth. Unlike the wise men, however, the drummer has no gift—so he gives what he has. He plays his drum, saying, "I played my best for Him."

This echoes the worship Jesus described when He told of the widow and her two coins: "Truly I tell you,' he said, 'this poor widow has put in more than all the others. All these people gave their gifts out of their wealth; but she out of her poverty put in all she had to live on'" (Luke 21:3-4).

All the drummer boy had was his drum and all the poor widow had were her two coins, but the God they worshiped was worthy of their all. He is worthy of our all as well, having given His all for us.



Luke 2:8-18




What, in Mary's life, allowed her to believe the message from the angel Gabriel?

The Virgin Mary was born to elderly parents, Joachim and Anna, who took her to the Temple in Jerusalem when she was three years old to be consecrated to God. Because her parents were quite old, they left her there. While living in the Temple, Mary and the other maidens were taught the Law of God, prayed and read the Scriptures. Mary remained there until she was 14 and, according to law, could no longer stay there and had to wed. She was betrothed by a high priest to a distant relative of hers, a widowed octogenarian named Joseph. During Mary's first year with Joseph, the angel Gabriel was sent by God to visit her. Perhaps being raised in the Temple allowed Mary to believe and accept Gabriel's message that she was chosen to bear the Messiah. How much faith did that require? How much faith do we need today to believe that the God we worship truly loves us? We re-visit the story of the Nativity every year and celebrate the Christmas season. But do we really believe that the infant born so long ago came for us? Perhaps that is what faith is all about – the belief that a tiny baby would save the world by proclaiming love for everyone, hope beyond despair, the promise of everlasting life, and dying for the sins of all. Those items are, perhaps, the greatest gifts for mankind.


